Let us join hands and work tirelessly towards the realization of an economically empowered South Africa. Together, we can be the catalysts for change that our nation needs.



The Rotary Foundation transforms your gifts into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. Since it was founded more than 100 years ago, the Foundation has spent more than \$4 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects.

The mission of The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

In November, Rotary International dedicates to the programs and activities of the Rotary Foundation and this gives us a wonderful opportunity to focus our attention on the many great things that our foundation delivers to our world.

We take so much for granted as we enjoy our privileged life. Water streams from every one of the 10 or so taps in our houses, medical aid is just around the corner, a strong and active education system provides a future for all our children and with the exception of a few, we want for nothing. How different it is for one-third of the world's population!



Including our efforts in the area of polio eradication, your Foundation provided something like \$180 million last year to support clubs and districts in their efforts to 'do good in the world'. If you add the money supplied by clubs and districts to complete these projects, we would have a conservative spend of something like \$450 million so we are not a small, insignificant organization. We are a highly relevant significant group and we should never fail to make that point with our friends.

Nothing ever comes cheap and everything The Foundation does costs money. When the money runs out so does our ability to make a difference. Clubs can take the bull by the horns and agree to pay their TRF commitment now rather than wait until the traditional 'rush' period. We will get our money working sooner rather than later and that will help enormously. If all the clubs in District 9400 could do this then The Foundation would be in a much stronger position.




We can also help as individuals. Those of us with *Every Rotarian Every Year* commitments who aren't tied into a scheduled payment plan could consider paying this month. It's only \$100 per person but collectively it has the power to do so much. Those of us who haven't yet made the EREY 'leap of faith' might give the possibility a little extra thought. That extra \$1.92 (~R40) a week can make such a difference to the people depending on us for a better life.

Since her appointment as District PolioPlus Chair in July 2023, IPP Muda has received overwhelming support from Rotarians who volunteered to serve alongside her, making it very easy to formulate the District PolioPlus Committee, representing all four D9400 countries.

What is key is to have a clear strategy and to plot a way forward for the Committee to align with District goals. A challenging fact is that 50% of Clubs in the District are deemed to be "Non-Giving" to PolioPlus and Muda's main objective is to advocate for Clubs to work towards changing this narrative, and for the District to have a different report at the end of RY 2023-24. The Committee therefore, has a mammoth task to encourage and support Rotarians and Clubs in their countries, to prioritise Polio awareness activities and to contribute/raise funds for the PolioPlus Fund.

What is also humbling is to see the level of dedication and commitment that the District Committee members have, to serve above self. One can safely say it is every Rotarian's wish to see Rotary and its international partners eradicate the remaining 1% Polio for good, this would be the best gift Rotarians can give to humanity. "It is with great pride that as a District Chair, I introduce the foot soldiers of PolioPlus in our District and without any doubt, I believe that this Committee has the heart and capable hands to turn the District around and help Rotary International to achieve this goal", said Muda.

Please ensure no matrics are on the Interact Board as the matriculants have much to do in their last year and might drop the ball on **Interact** unintentionally, so it is suggested to select the Interact board for 2024 from the current Grade 10's and the President Elect from the current Grade 9's. **Interact** matriculants can still be part of **Interact** and will fit projects/ events into their schedules where possible, so please do not leave them out of **Interact** communication and projects.

The Induction of the board for 2024 can either take place early December 2023 or early in January 2024 with the sponsoring Rotary club and **Interact** parents in attendance - make it a big event similar to our own Rotary Inductions. More to follow regarding the Inductions.


Rotary Club of **Vanderbijlpark**

On World Polio Day Rotarians worldwide raise awareness and funds for polio eradication. Polio is a paralytic disease caused by a virus that can be prevented by vaccination of ALL children under 5 years of age. However, vaccinating all children worldwide requires lots of money.

PDG Stella of RC Pretoria West initiated a major fundraising where she undertook to walk 4-5km every other day until the 24th, and asked for a donation of R20/\$1 for every km walked. She posted her walking details each day and on the 24th, she calculated the total km walked, and each friend will kindly donate for those km walked. Donations can be sent to the account of my Rotary club, given below. Your donation will help make polio history.

Her personal commitment to this cause was ignited during my time with the World Health Organization in 1996, where I aided WHO/AFRO in large-scale immunization drives against polio in Africa.


