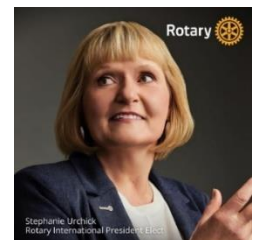
## The last presidential theme for Rotary International



The 2024-2025 theme "*The magic of Rotary*" and logo was announced mid-January by RI President Elect, Stephanie Urchick.

Decisions made at the RI board meeting of 16–18 October 2023 at Rotary International World Headquarters in Evanston, IL, USA will result in **major changes to RI's present system**.

One of the most far-reaching highlights is the discontinuing of the annual **Rotary Presidential theme** and logo, beginning in the 2025–26 Rotary year.



# FEBRUARY is PEACE & CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION MONTH

The theme for February is about promoting peace and projects that are aimed at peace building and conflict prevention. This is at the heart of all of Rotary's work.

Fostering Peace and Understanding led to Youth Exchange Programmes.

It led to our Rotary Peace Fellowships - Over 1000 professionals have been selected and trained in Rotary's Peace Centres in Universities around the world. They are now working for peace in over 100 countries.

We refuse to accept conflict as a way of life. Rotary projects provide training that fosters understanding and provides communities with the skills to resolve conflicts



Through our service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, our members are taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources. There can be no Peace while people have poor water, disease, poor Mother & Child health, no education, and poverty.

Conflict and violence displace millions of people each year. Half of those killed in conflict are children, and 90 percent are civilians. We help leaders learn how to prevent and mediate conflict at its source.

As Rotarians, we should all be similarly committed to understanding the conflicts that exist in our own society, to speak out when necessary, and to seek solutions that reflect the values of Rotary.

Through Global Grant activities, Clubs and Districts can participate in strategically focused, high-impact activities that align with Rotary goals that address this area of focus including to train leaders, including potential youth leaders, to prevent and mediate conflict, support peacebuilding in communities and regions affected by conflict, and to support studies related to peace and conflict prevention/resolution for career-minded professionals.

# 2024 Rotary International Assembly

Every year in January, Rotary International calls a special international assembly. All District Governors Elect in the World are required to attend the International Assembly. The purpose of the Assembly is to train DGEs in their duties and to meet with RI leaders. One of the exciting opportunities that International Assembly provides is the chance to meet and partner with other districts from around the world to accomplish good internationally.

In the heart of Orlando, Florida, USA from January 7 to 11, the vibrant spirit of Rotary took centre stage as the dynamic duo from Pretoria District 9400, represented their region at the prestigious Rotary International Assembly.

District governor-elect George Senosha and assistant governor-elect Thabang Chiloane stood proudly as ambassadors, bringing the rich tapestry of Rotary in their corner of the world to the global forefront.

District 9400 encompasses a vast territory spanning Botswana, Eswatini and the southern part of Mozambique. With a collective force of 63 clubs and 1044 members, this district is a powerhouse of Rotary impact in a region with diverse challenges and opportunities.

The International Assembly served as a melting pot for Rotary leaders, providing a platform for interaction among district governors-elect, their spouses, and aides from across the globe. This week-long event wasn't just a ceremonial gathering but a crucible for preparing the next cohort of district leaders poised to take the reins from July 2024 to June 2025.

Under the "Rotary Magic" theme, Rotary International president-elect Stephanie A. Urchick set the tone for the upcoming Rotary year. Her impassioned challenge echoed through the grand halls of the assembly, reverberating with a call to action for all district governors: increase membership and establish new clubs worldwide while championing the principles of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in Rotary.

"I challenge all districts to grow their membership by 100 members or more and establish at least four new clubs. If we are not growing, we are certainly dying," proclaimed Urchick with an urgency that resonated with the essence of Rotary's global mission.

Urchick highlighted the organisation's instrumental role in nearly eradicating polio worldwide in a poignant reminder of Rotary's impactful legacy. The disease, once rampant worldwide with over three thousand cases in the 1980s, now persists in only 12 cases in Pakistan and Afghanistan, thanks to Rotary's relentless efforts. Over \$1.2 billion has been invested globally in various charitable causes by Rotary, showcasing the organisation's commitment to making a positive change in the world.

Rotary International's Seven Areas of Focus, including promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, supporting education, and protecting the environment, were reiterated as the guiding principles for clubs worldwide. These areas form the bedrock of Rotary's day-to-day activities, serving as a blueprint for transformative change.

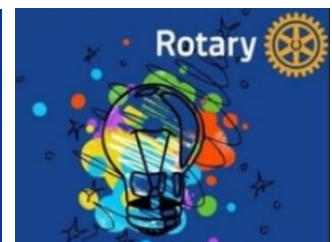
Senosha expressed his enthusiasm for the Rotary Community Corp recognition by the Rotary International president-elect. The Rotary Community Corp, a vital conduit for community engagement, plays a pivotal role in Rotary's quest to make a real difference in the world. The eagerness displayed by Urchick to reach remote and "hard to reach areas" such as Pakistan has enthused Senosha to do the same in his district as he starts his year as District Governor for D9400.

Chiloane, reflecting on the experience, remarked, "I learned a great deal about the vision of the incoming Rotary International president, and it will be easier for me to support the incoming district governor in his role in the coming year. I am thankful for attending the assembly and making many contacts worldwide."

As the curtain falls on the International Assembly in Orlando, the Pretoria duo of Rotarians leaves an indelible mark, carrying the torch of Rotary's transformative magic with them. Their journey has just begun, but the echoes of their presence will undoubtedly resonate across District 9400 and beyond, inspiring a new wave of Rotary leaders to create lasting change in the world.

Our top guest speakers will speak on our theme "**Empower to Prosper**" and address it from various perspectives in which they are experts – township economy, artificial intelligence, humanitarian field, mental health and survival. Apart from **Vusi Thembekwayo**, I am also happy to reveal some of our other speakers at the 2024 DISCON.

**Guest speaker:**

**Ziaad Suleman**



He will speak on our theme "**Empower to Prosper**" from an artificial intelligence (AI) perspective.

**Ziaad Suleman** is the Chief Commercial Officer and an Exco Member of EOH, one of South Africa's largest technology services companies. He believes that adaptability, agility, and a forward-thinking mindset is needed to navigate the fast-moving digital economy.

Over and above EOH, Ziaad represents South Africa as the SA Chair of 4IR on BRICS, Chair of the ICT 4IR Public Private Growth Initiative, ICT Lead on the Digital Work Accelerator Presidential Programme, Independent Non-Executive Chairperson of Qode, Non-Executive Director of Charities Aid Foundation Southern Africa and Executive Member of D1GIT NPO.

Ziaad was previously a Director and the Chief Operating Officer for IBM Southern Africa. He was schooled at St. Johns College, Johannesburg and has an honours degree in Law with distinction from University of Natal. He also obtained an MDP Business Management degree with distinction from GIBS Business School.

**Guest speaker:**

**Anas Al-Hamati**



He will speak on our theme "**Empower to Prosper**" from a humanitarian perspective.

**Anas Al-Hamati** received a Peace scholarship from the Rotary Club of Sandton, D9400 in 2021 to attend the Rotary Peace Center program for graduate studies, at the International Christian University in Tokyo, Japan (2022-2024).

He is a project manager in the humanitarian field with Gift of the Givers with more than 10 years' experience and has worked in several countries around the world. He facilitated the negotiations to release Yolande and Pierre Korkie Al-Qaеeda captives in Yemen, without any ransom.

He holds a Bachelor's Degree in French literature from the faculty of arts – University of Sana'a (Yemen), a postgraduate degree in management practice from Henley business school (Johannesburg, RSA) and an MBA in business administration from the University of Reading, UK with a specialty in "Organizational leadership in Volatile, Uncertain, Complex and Ambiguous (VUCA) business environment". Currently he is an MA candidate at the International Christian University (Tokyo, Japan). His research is about "Stability and development accelerations strategies in fragile states".

**Guest speaker:**

**Emmanuel Taban**



He will speak on our theme "**Empower to Prosper**" from the perspective of overcoming extreme adversity.

Dr Emmanuel Taban is a former child refugee and was only 17 years old when he arrived in Johannesburg from war-torn South Sudan with nothing. His epic journey to triumph is captured in an autobiography called "The Boy Who Never Gave Up". His motto is "Your colour does not limit you, but your mental capacity will limit you".

Today, he is a pulmonologist, and the Director and Partner at The Lung Institute. Dr Emmanuel Taban was named as one of the 100 Most Influential Africans of 2020 by London-based New African magazine.

Dr Taban made the headlines during the COVID-19 pandemic when he successfully used a unique procedure known as flexible fibre-optic bronchoscopy on critically ill COVID-19 patients. He studied at the Medical University of Southern Africa (MEDUNSA), University of Pretoria and University of Witwatersrand.

CEO Sue Paget, recently announced the first RFHA Annual Report. She extended her heartfelt gratitude to each one who has been an integral part of the RFHA family.

On the ground, Rotary clubs work with local NGOs and their government to mobilize hundreds of additional partners to provide add-on services at site level and engage thousands of community volunteers. There has been incredible progress and we set our sights on an even more impactful future through shared commitment to health, hope, and humanity. The healthcare initiatives have expanded to fostering transformative collaborations.

This 2022-2023 RFHA Annual Report provides a comprehensive overview of the impactful journey together with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in the past year, highlighting the milestones, challenges overcome, and the collective strides made towards our shared vision. Recently, Rotary Family Health Days made a significant impact in Mozambique, bringing essential healthcare services to communities in need at the third edition of Rotary Family Health Days in Matutuine, Mozambique.

Just as the majority of an iceberg is concealed beneath the water, the success of health days is rooted in the extensive efforts below the surface, ensuring a solid foundation for impactful, community-driven healthcare initiatives that reach those who need it most. The unseen aspects include strategic planning, collaboration with local communities and healthcare providers, logistical coordination, and the dedication of volunteers and healthcare professionals.

# Rotary Peace Fellow

## Recruit candidates



Districts and Rotary and Rotaract clubs play a key role in recruiting and recommending Rotary Peace Fellow candidates. Each year, The Rotary Foundation awards fellowships to leaders in peace and development to study at one of the Rotary Peace Centers at premier universities around the world. The fellows can earn a master's degree or a postgraduate diploma through the professional development certificate program.



The application will be open 1 February through 15 May, and the peace fellows who are selected will begin their studies in 2025. Find out [who is eligible and how they can apply](#).

Help midcareer change-makers and young professionals who have [peacebuilding experience](#) apply for a fully funded [Rotary Peace Fellowship](#). Connect with your district Rotary Peace Fellowship subcommittee chair to [learn more about recruiting candidates](#) from your communities.

Among the applicants who are accepted this year will be members of the first cohort at Rotary's newest peace center, Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey. The new center will offer a [certificate program](#) in peace and development studies for candidates who plan to focus on peacebuilding in the Middle East and North Africa region.

Since the Rotary Peace Centers program began in 2002, more than 1,700 fellows have graduated. They are now working on peace and development initiatives in more than 140 countries. Many serve as leaders in government, nongovernmental organizations, education and research institutions, peacekeeping and law enforcement agencies, media and the arts, and international organizations such as UNICEF, the United Nations, the World Bank, and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies. If you know people who might be interested in joining Rotary, follow your club's process for proposing a new member or ask them to complete the [Join Rotary form](#). The form allows prospective members to indicate their preference for a club meeting location.

When new members join your club, engage with them right away. Make sure all new members take the [member interest survey](#) so you can understand their interests and how they'd like to get involved. According to recent Rotary research, a fulfilling club experience still is what matters most to members. But creating that experience is complex, and it takes time to figure out what works for your club. Luckily, the [Club Experience Concierge](#) is available to give you tailored advice. This online, interactive resource offers ways to improve the five aspects of the club experience that matter most to members.

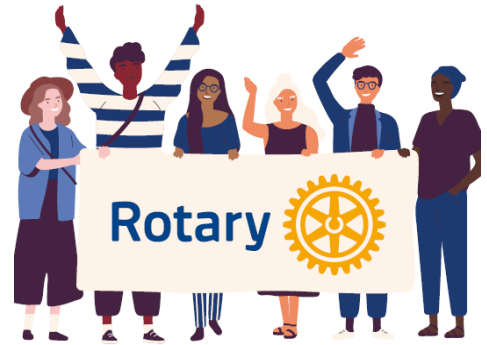
# D9400 Stewardship Committee

Proper financial planning and management contribute to the stability and continuity of programs and initiatives, allowing Rotary International to have a lasting impact on its beneficiaries.

The Stewardship Committee plays an important role in managing grants within a Rotary club or district. The Stewardship Committee is a subcommittee of the Foundation Committee.



To ensure continuous improvement in the grant management process it is necessary to regularly review and update grant management processes and guidelines. By adhering to the management processes and guidelines, Rotary grants are used wisely, contribute to meaningful and sustainable projects, and align with Rotary's mission of service above self.

To assist Rotary Clubs and the District to ensure that grant activities comply with Rotary International's terms and conditions, a grant monitoring and evaluation guideline document have been drafted. This document is not a comprehensive guide and committee members should also refer to the various policies and guides as referenced in the document.

## High school student creates water harvesting innovation

Looking for collaborators to spread her invention far and wide



Madeline Abrams, ([mlabrams06@gmail.com](mailto:mlabrams06@gmail.com)) a junior student at Green Meadow Waldorf School in New York USA, has created a unique way to use discarded water bottles to create an irrigation system for growing vegetables. Her project coach, Ron Feuchs, is very proud of the water harvesting system she invented and is helping to promote the concept amongst Rotarians.

Her innovation can benefit communities and help people harvest rain water for growing vegetables and crops. By using empty water bottles, cutting them in half lengthwise, duct taping them with water proof tape, Madeline has created a gutter system to capture the rainfall that comes off of a roof. She then uses water bottles to create a downspout to direct the water to a holding tank similar to a rain barrel.

**Harvest Every Drop** is a system designed to vastly increase the amount of rainwater collected using an existing surface area and accessible, upcycled materials. The inclusion of "single-use" plastic bottles directly helps to address plastic waste.

Madeline recently presented on Zoom to Rotary Clubs in Zone 22 and will be presenting her water harvesting innovation again on Zoom on 18 February.

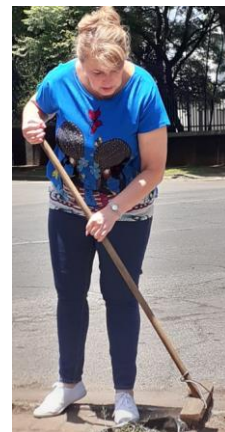

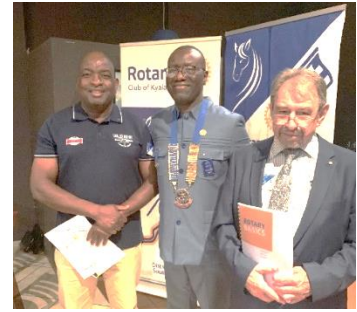
