Message from the District Governor: Dr Stella Anyangwe

Fellow Rotarians, Rotaractors and Friends of Rotary, May is the penultimate month in the Rotary Year, and it has been truly hectic! We continued to carry out routine Rotary duties, even as we kept up with support for flood-ravaged KZN Province in D9370.

A shout out to RC Johannesburg North Central for sponsoring yet another Interact club this month, in addition to the one sponsored last month!

The much-awaited Building Better Businesses Symposium (BBB) of the Townships Project was a huge success, with dozens of young entrepreneurs from various townships gaining knowledge and mentorship from seasoned Rotarians and others. Our trusted international partner, Martha Deacon, was of great support, as were several Rotary Clubs in the District. Kudos to them all.

Training was carried out, and successfully too. RLI training for Parts 1,2,3 and A, B, C were very well attended, and thanks go to District Trainer Wendy and her Team.

The first-ever POETS in Portuguese also took place in Maputo, in collaboration with D9210, with whom D9400 shares Mozambique. Now all incoming Presidents and Officers of Rotary clubs in D9400 have received a thorough briefing on the year of service that they will be starting on 1st July 2022. Bravo to DGE Koekie and her counterpart of D9210 for making this a possibility.

It is sad news indeed that this month, another wild polio virus case surfaced in Tete Province, Central Mozambique, and linked to the case in Malawi, and both traced to a case in Pakistan thousands of kilometers away. We therefore continue to warn the world that if one country still has circulating wild polio virus, all countries are at risk. The only answer is wide scale vaccination against polio.

My visit to the Rotary clubs in Botswana (25th-28th May) was a huge success, and during which I visited some amazing projects undertaken by Rotary and Rotaract clubs. I also attended the 50th anniversary celebrations of the RC Gaborone, in the presence of a Friendship Exchange group from the USA that was visiting the club. It was indeed a memorable occasion.

Mensagem Da Governadora Do Distrito: Dr Stella Anyangwe



JUNE IS ROTARY FELLOWSHIPS MONTH. Rotary Fellowships are international, independently organized groups of Rotarians, Rotary partners, and Rotaractors who share a common recreational interest or vocation. This month is recognition of the opportunity to have fun, make new friends around the world and enhance the experience of Rotary that belonging to a Rotary Fellowship enables.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when a group of Rotarians with an interest in Esperanto joined together. In 1947, Rotarians organized a group of boating enthusiasts, which became the Yachting Fellowship.

This joining together to share common interests and activities gained attention and operated over the years under various names as World Fellowship Activities; International Vocational Contact Groups; Rotary Recreational and Vocational Fellowships; and finally Rotary Fellowships.

Benefits of Rotary Fellowships:

- Enable Rotarians to make lasting friendships outside their own club, district or country .
- Contribute to the advancement of Rotary's public image and identity
- Serve as an incentive for joining Rotary and for continuing as a member

Each fellowship functions independently of Rotary International, establishing its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure. Each Fellowship must maintain a membership base representing at least 3 Countries. Membership is open to Rotarians, spouses of Rotarians and Rotaractors. Each Fellowship elects at least 3 Officers to oversee the group's operations. Fellowships are expected to facilitate communication amongst their members and to maintain regular communication with Rotary International.

One of Rotary's many Fellowships which regularly attracts Rotarians around the globe as competitors is the International Chess Fellowship for Rotarians (ICFR).

COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

Council of Legislation dealt with 94 Enactments; only 29 were adopted.

All Club Presidents have received notifications of these Enactments. The necessary Opposition to Legislation Report Form was sent with the notification.

- 1 July 2022 New legislation takes effect.
- 1 August 2022 Deadline for Clubs wanting to oppose enactments
- **1 October 2022 Publication** of updated Manual of Procedure if no objections are received.
- **30 June 2022 Deadline** for proposing Resolutions and submitting after confirmation from Governor. Resolutions deal with the Rotary World and not the Rotary Constitution.

THE MOST ESSENTIAL ADOPTED ENACTMENTS:

awareness about Rotary

- Board to provide written minutes to Club members within 30 days of meeting.
- Satellite Club is a potential Club whose members are also members of a Club.
- Rotaractors can be members of RI Committees.
- Removal of Past Officer Status for cause Rotarian will be given opportunity to provide reasons why should not be done.
- Allow Rotaractors to attend Rotary Club meetings.
- Remove the attendance report requirements.
- Amend the Avenues of Service to include positive peace.
- Board may change the Boundaries of a district if fewer than 20 clubs of 1,100 Rotarians

Increase per capita dues of up \$5,5 over a 3½ year period: \$35-50 in 2022/2023 per half year; \$37-50 in 2023/2024; \$39-25 in 2024; \$41 in 2025/2026

NPC Board for next year consists of a total of seven: IPDG Stella Anyangwe; DG Koekie Makunyane-Quashie; DGE Riana Pretorius; DGN George Senosha plus co-opted members PP Jean Bernardo & two others.

LEARN MORE ABOUT ROTARY GRANTS

Easier-to-use grant terms and conditions

The grant terms and conditions have been updated and separated into two documents: one for <u>district grants</u> and one for <u>global grants</u>. This will alleviate some confusion and make it easier to find the specific information you're looking for.

A Guide to Global Grants helps members who want to apply for a global grant or develop more effective and sustainable service projects. You can take steps to receive your global grant payments faster by making sure that the name of the account you enter into the Grant Center is an exact match with the name on the bank account. Also note that grant payments for club-sponsored projects need to be directed to club-controlled accounts, and grant payments for district-sponsored projects need to be directed to district-controlled accounts.





Apply for the Programs of Scale grant

If your club or district project has proved its success and is ready to be expanded, consider applying for the next Programs of Scale grant. Every year, this grant awards \$2 million to a well-developed, evidence-based program led by Rotary members in collaboration with experienced partner organizations. The 2022-23 Programs of Scale application will be available by 10 June. Clubs and districts have until 1 August to submit concept notes summarizing their project's results, partnerships, and goals.

Learn more about applying for the grant and find resources to strengthen your local and international projects. The recipient of the 2022 Programs of Scale grant will be announced during the <u>Rotary</u> International Convention.

Rotary Action Groups Annual Report now available

In 2020-21, Rotary's 27 Action Groups (RAGs) brought together 34,000 members and friends across more than 150 countries in support of more than 2,400 service projects. They also raised nearly \$1 million to fund projects. <u>Download the annual action group report</u> to learn more.

First polio outbreak in 30 years in Mozambique



Thanks to ongoing disease surveillance, the Global Polio Laboratory Network (GPLN) has <u>confirmed</u> that a child in the north-eastern Tête province, Mozambique, was paralyzed by type 1 wild poliovirus (WPV1). This marks the second imported case of wild poliovirus in southern Africa this year, following an outbreak in Malawi in mid-February.

The single case so far, is the country's first since 1992. The infected child began experiencing onset of paralysis in late March. The newly confirmed case is linked to a strain that had been circulating in Pakistan in 2019, similar to the case reported in Malawi earlier this year, the World Health Organization (WHO) noted.

Polio is transmitted mainly via contaminated water and food, or through contact form an infected person. The virus can cause paralysis, which is sometimes fatal.

It cannot be cured, but infection can be prevented by vaccination.

Africa was declared free of indigenous wild polio in August 2020 after eliminating all forms of wild polio from the region. The cases in Mozambique and Malawi do not affect Africa's wild poliovirus-free certification, because the virus strain is not indigenous, WHO stressed.

"The detection of another case of wild polio virus in Africa is greatly concerning, even if it's unsurprising, given the recent outbreak in Malawi. However, it shows how dangerous this virus is and how quickly it can spread," said Dr Matshidiso Moeti, WHO Regional Director for Africa.

Yet when Michel Zaffran became director of Polio Eradication at the World Health Organization in 2016, the forecast for crossing the finish line on a three-decade-long mission was optimistic. "We thought that Africa was out of the woods," he says, "and we would just be focusing on Pakistan and Afghanistan."

And then, a storm of setbacks: outbreaks in multiple WHO regions, a new proliferation of vaccine misinformation, a rogue vaccine-derived strain, and the COVID-19 pandemic, which temporarily halted vital door-to-door immunizations.

However, during Zaffran's tenure, remarkable progress was achieved: The worldwide eradication of type 3 poliovirus. The certification of wild polio eradication in WHO's African region. A brighter outlook for Afghanistan and Pakistan. And the onboarding of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, as a full partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative — a major development in financing the inactivated polio vaccine (IPV).

The SOUNS project has been revived with the Viva Foundation, PEN and a new partnership with the Rotary Club of Pretoria West at the Viva Village crèche in Mamelodi, Pretoria where SOUNS was introduced in 2011. Since then, they have used SOUNS to equip their pupils in the basics of reading as well as expanding to a second

A recent training session served as a renewal of skills for four of their established teachers and an introduction for another four. Four new SOUNS sets were handed out. This session with PEN was attended by 13 of their trainers and their two managers. The skills to effectively use SOUNS were reviewed. Each of those trainers serves many creches so a real cascade of skills has been created another really rewarding success story.





Rotary Club of Pretoria East

PEN has been the most loyal partner in the SOUNS project of the Rotary Club of Pretoria East. Starting in 2011, the project introduced SOUNS to about 30 creches per annum in the central areas of Pretoria. On average those creches had about 20 to 100 pupils, so by working on 50 pupils per creche, PEN has introduced





SOUNS from 2011 to 2021 to over 15 000 pupils. Now (2022), PEN has expanded to 108 creches and the SOUNS project is only introduced to those crèches that meet defined standards but assuming 100 creches are using SOUNS, and 50 pupils are in each creche, PEN now introduces SOUNS to 5000 pupils per annum. The books are sold for only R5-00 each, they cost R7 to R10, the difference made up by funds donated from our Swedish Club partners.

The Rotary Club of Randburg, Interact Club of Khensani and Noble Pursuits came together with Earthly Touch Foundation to commemorate Earth Day by laying the foundation of the Ecocentre, which is being constructed using ecobricks. The three Clubs and the community of Diepsloot have joined forces to construct this green building as our contribution to combating plastic pollution and reducing the impact of global warming.

Rotary Club of Randburg Interact Club

The project will repurpose over 36 tonnes of plastic, provide classrooms to 150 students and create 20 I temporary jobs in the Diepsloot community.



This project has seen a number of organisations, schools, churches and volunteers all playing their part by donating ecobricks, plastic and empty 2-litre bottles.

The organisation has also offered training in ecobrick making to various organisations and has received more than 10 000 ecobricks from the community.



Rotaract Club of Johannesburg

The President of the Rotaract Club of Johannesburg, Renaldy Beyeme, recently led a team of volunteers to visit the village of Nyavinin in the Eastern Cape, close to the KwaZulu Natal border. To learn more about this community watch this video <u>This Place is Heaven - YouTube</u>

The Rotaractors are investigating more sustainable solutions that will have a greater impact on the community. It has given hope to the community as the volunteers provided sanitary items, school stationery and raincoats.
